Also, many thanks for all of the knitting which you do and the other items you donate for the baby banks, the refuges and for the refugees. Recently I have been given three twiddle muffs, see photo, which will get taken into our Nursing Homes in Rastrick. How lovely and generous is that?!



Other activities continue as usual... helping out at New Hall Prison in the visitors' tea bar, in the mother and baby unit and offering cooking classes to some of the women. Would you also like to volunteer for any of these activities? See me, Ann Johnson or Margaret France. We are getting involved with a scheme initiated by the Anglican Chaplain at New Hall.... she recognises that after the women leave New Hall that they may wish to attend a church in the area where they live. They may have come to faith whilst in the Prison or have been a Christian for many years. The Anglican chaplain has asked us to assist in finding a MU Member in the area where they are going to live. This could be as far west as Liverpool, and into Cumbria, north towards Carlisle and south to Doncaster and eastwards over to Hull. So, a diverse area, and we are looking for MU Members who could take a willing ex offender into their own church in these areas.

This month we had the MU Coffee and

Goodies Day held at Freda Broadbent's house. We all had a great time, chatting for longer than is usual after church and at meetings, and we were faced with a delicious array of home baking and

produce and many of us had our lunch whilst

we were there. We made a whopping £372. But if we had not made anything then it would still have been a very successful fun and day.

The MU held their annual retreat at Parceval Hall from Tuesday 21 -23 May. These days were led by Revd. Michelle and they offered a spiritual haven in glorious countryside. These three days gave us an opportunity to step back from the busyness of our lives and to look at various Bible passages and discuss what they meant to ourselves. It is difficult to explain how each day unfolded for each of us, since I am sure that each individual will have absorbed different positives and challenges. During this year we will organise a further one day, to set aside from our busy lives, and to allow peace and calm to enter our thoughts . ECO CHURCH UPDATE

Eco Church Update, June 2024 - by John

1. July 4th is fast approaching - Use Your Vote!

Did you know that Friends of the Earth recently won a High Court action against the Government, because of its failure to produce a detailed plan to mitigate climate change? This was poignant in view of the Government's 'row back' last November on its climate pledges. The Government intends to 'max out on' our North Sea oil and gas reserves. The rise in global temperatures continues unabated, and on average climate scientists predict that – given the worldwide lack of political will – the earth will be 2.7 degC hotter by the end of this century than in 1950. Many countries will, by then, be uninhabitable.

So, what would the various parties do about climate change in government? Each of us will have different voting priorities on 4th July, but here's one of my key criteria. Which party, and which parliamentary candidate is prepared to support bold action *now?*

2. An example to follow.

Barbara Rainford (from St Matthews) and I attended an inspirational Eco Church workshop at Marion Russell's church, St Mary's Embsay, on 12th May. St Mary's has recently achieved the Gold award and their team generously shared with us the steps they've taken to get there – each of the 59 improvements featuring on one of the tapestries shown! (See page 15)

St Mary's will soon be entirely heated by electricity. Getting to this stage has been a long journey. Initially they were advised to install solar panels and heat pumps. Their eventual solution is quite different! Tapestries from St Mary's Embsay



3. **Churches Count for Nature.** During the week 8-16th June, we'll be taking part in this event. It involves carrying out a count of plant species and wildlife in the church gardens. Rosemary has already engaged the Brownies to take part, and we'll be organising sessions for church members too.



Full Day Walk - Saturday 22nd June THE LUDDITE TRAIL


Comprising of two parts which together commemorate the route taken by the Luddite marchers in April 1812.

Notes from a churchwarden 12 - Dad

As it's both Fathers Day and the D-Day Landings 80th Anniversary this month, it put me in mind of my own father. So I am writing this piece in his memory. It has no particular religious significance, other than the fact he was a regular churchgoer, but may be of interest.

He was a mild mannered man, whom I never saw lose his temper. He

was born in 1917 and lived just off Tuel Lane, Sowerby Bridge. By 14 he was driving and his first car was his parents 1929 Morris Cowley. During 1932 and 1933 he was taken on school trips to the Lake District, staying at Wall End Farm in Langdale, which began a lifelong love of the area (the only gap being during the war years), which I have continued to this day. Dad studied at Halifax Technical College and took the London University external B.Sc.(Hons) course in engineering, graduating in 1937



Joining Metro Vickers in 1937, he was encouraged to get experience with an external organization, and he and Leslie Wilcox had the chance of a



trip up the Amazon as engineer on the SS Anselm (torpedoed and sunk in 1941 by a U-boat). There was only one position and it was decided on the toss of a coin. My father won, and so in 1938 he set sail from Liverpool. He told me that he was 6th engineer on the ship, but as the other 5 were nearly always drunk, he ended up doing most of the work. The picture, taken by my father, shows the Amazonian Forest in 1938. On his return and before the war started he was involved in

the original electrification of the Manchester-Sheffield railway line.

In 1939, my father joined up, in the Royal Engineers as a Lieutenant. He

was posted to London during the blitz and spent 9 months digging out unexploded bombs. He was then posted to North Africa and I have maps covering areas around Sidi Barrani, Salum and the defences at Tobruk (Remember the film 'Ice Cold in Alex'). At one point he and his men had to drive from Mersa Matruh (Picture is Dad at Mersa Matruh 1941) to Aleppo in Syria, a trip of about 1000 miles. Whilst in Syria he had to drive round the desert for about two weeks as far as Iraq, passing through Palmyra.



(The picture below is of farming in Syria 1941) At one point their Morris 15cwt truck sank to the axles in the sand and some friendly nomads



pulled them out. He was then posted to Cairo, promoted to Captain and had to prepare for the invasion of Italy in 1943, landing at Augusta, Sicily. His group's job was to restore electricity generating units damaged or destroyed by the retreating Germans, and he worked with the

Italian partisans. He was promoted again to Major around this time. In 1945 he returned home on the M.V. Georgic (a ship that had been bombed and sunk at Port Tewfik in Egypt in 1941, but refloated and returned to service in 1944). He found a copy of Trollopes 'The Warden' on board which he read on the way home. I remember my father was quite keen on Trollope.

Dad then married my mum on February 14th 1946 at St Mary's in Elland, and was demobbed later that year. He returned to Metro Vickers, but soon moved to ICI, for a much increased salary. Originally working in Huddersfield, he was transferred to Blackley, Manchester in 1956 as Divisional Electrical Engineer. I remember well my father travelling over to Manchester every day, and probably not getting back home till between 6pm and 7pm and then working on the dining room table, with papers and folders around him. The M62 had not been



built and he would travel on the old Nont's road as it was called (after the Nont Sarah pub, a fairly isolated hostelry on the way) come rain, snow, wind or sun.

On Sundays, we would have the traditional Sunday Roast, with my father at the head of the table carving, whilst a portrait of 'The Laughing Cavalier' on the wall behind, was seemingly watching him making sure he did it properly.

He was also a member of the 'English Speaking Union' for a while in the 1970's/80's, although I do not know in what capacity. He went to Germany with them and delivered a speech in German. I remember him learning the language using BBC 'Komm Mit' records. My father was quite good at languages and either on holiday or with work, he would always take the time to learn the language.

My Mum, unfortunately had a recurrence of the cancer that she had developed in 1960. My father would take her over to Christie's in Manchester for treatment. My father then, had a mild heart attack in 1971, apparently on the golf course; so mild he didn't know he'd had one until the doctor told him, but he was taken into hospital and wired up for a while. Unfortunately it was around my 21^{st} birthday at Easter which I was to celebrate in Grasmere. I was going to cancel it, but my parents

determined I should go, and so I went on my own, meeting up with our usual group for the celebrations. In 1972 my dad took early retirement as my mum was very ill. She died in November 1973.

A year or two later, on a visit to his sister and her husband in Elland, he met Anne. Making up a bridge four (my parents were quite keen bridge players socially) Dad and Anne, both having lost their spouses found mutual pleasure in each other's company and married on 1st January 1976, with myself as best man, which I was delighted to do, but found a little strange. Anne had Parkinson's disease, but they had 17 happy years together and would often go on short trips to North Yorkshire. Dad looked after Anne as her condition gradually deteriorated, uncomplaining and coping as he always did. I have heard him described, on more than one occasion, as 'a proper gentleman'. Anne sadly passed away in 1993.

It was after Dad retired, that he took up watercolour painting. He had always been able to draw and had done many pen and ink sketches, which would grace anybody's wall. Taking some lessons from Ashley Jackson he developed into a decent painter and joined the local Art Circle. He painted for pleasure, and gave



paintings to any friends that wanted one. He did however, put some up for sale and I recall he had some paintings with him on a visit to Ilkley. He went into a gallery to browse and after a conversation with the owner, showed him the paintings he had with him (he had taken some to a friend to let them choose one). The gallery owner offered to sell them for him. My father only went into the gallery out of interest, not to sell his paintings. When my daughter was a few years old she saw my father painting the sky on the canvas. Some time later, when she saw a sunset, she said 'Has grandad been painting the sky again?'. An interesting association of ideas I think. Apart from his artistic accomplishments he could also play the violin. I have a record (an old 78) which he and my mother

made (My mother was an accomplished pianist) in the early fifties. It was not a commercial record and I think there must have been a means by which people could arrange to make their own records.

He was a keen amateur photographer, and I have many photographs taken going back to the 1920's and 1930's, including his war years. There are some of his Amazon trip, and also some of Palmyra during the war. (You may recall that Palmyra was destroyed in 2015.) He had a dark room built in to our house and built his own enlarger. He taught me how to develop and print my own black and white photographs, a skill that has now been sadly rendered obsolete by digital photography. As he got older he became involved with Probus and was President of the local branch. He was also treasurer at All Saints in Elland.

My father passed away in 2003, after a very active, successful and fulfilling life.

This is a very much 'potted' version of my father's life, and there are many more personal memories that are not mentioned here, but I like to remember him as 'a proper gentleman' and 'grandad who painted the sky'. Not bad epitaphs, I think. So everybody, if you've a mind to, remem-



ber your fathers on the 16th, there's probably a lot more to them than you realise. If the memories of your father are not good, then read and appreciate that most are.




"For the love to go on we must make it our song, You and I be the singers".



SHIRLEY... Sleepless Nights

The other night I couldn't sleep. My mind was going over things which had happened in my past. The good times, bad times, sad times and happy times. Then it wondered further into philosophical mode.

I concluded one's life span is like a pendulum, swinging from right to left in a great arc. Similar to each day, from the light of dawn awakening to darkness as we sleep Then my mind explored further, comparing life's journey which follows a similar pattern. We experience ups, the good

times and downs, the bad times. Often, we are at a 'junction' for a decision. Which road should we take? As I lay thinking, I could identify several places when I wondered if I had made the right choice. Would my life have been better



than it was now? "No", I concluded. It could have been much worse.

Using metaphors again, life is a journey which sometimes travels along a stoney road. I can identify with this. It is at these times that, guiltily I pray a little harder asking for God's help. In the Bible, Matthew Ch 7 v 7, we are encouraged to "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. 8 For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened." Sometimes the way things worked out surprised or maybe disappointed me. But I have survived and I believe this is because I have faith that God, and or Jesus, is walking life's path with me. This is a great comforting support, or cynical people call it a prop. I don't mind. I KNOW it makes a difference to me. I have been fortunate. I have not been tested as many are today. Those who have to cope with pain, disability, hunger, debt, loneliness, abuse, loss, persecution etc. Any one of these sufferings can, however, be lessened a little with the help of family and friends. Just knowing someone cares and is there to support in human form matters a great deal.

We can be those hands carrying out more of Jesus's words, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is this, thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself" (Matthew 22:37–39).

Without realising it, I slowly drifted off to sleep. In the morning, I decided to share the above with you.

Good News Days

I can remember, not long ago, mentioning the bad news which seems to surround us each day on the TV and newspapers. However, just lately, I have noted there is more good news around. Although it is easy for us to blame God for 'neglecting' his flock and Satan seems to have the upper hand, more and more people are coming forward to voice their concerns for this neglect. Dementia is being examined more closely instead of suffers being isolated. This also applies to mental illness in different forms such as PTS and domestic abuse. More people are being brought to justice by victims of sex abuse. I think God is giving a nudge to those who at one time would have been frightened to stand up for what they think is right. We need to take our worries to God in prayer more, and share with others our concerns about others' suffering, so that together we can create a better situation for more neglected people.
