

A Suggestion from Alan...



Your quiet time

"You're my place of quiet retreat; I wait for your Word to renew me."

Psalm 119:114 MSG

What's stopping you from having a regular quiet time with God? Maybe the very thought feels filled with 'shoulds' and 'ought tos'; like another item to add to the unending checklist of your life. So, you think, 'Maybe later, when life slows down.' We need to shed the myths and impractical expectations the Enemy uses to prevent us from experiencing the joy of knowing Jesus and being known by Him. David wrote: 'The one thing I ask of the Lord – the thing I seek most - is to live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, delighting in the Lord's perfections and meditating in his Temple. For he will conceal me there when troubles come; he will hide me in his sanctuary. He will place me out of reach on a high rock. Then I will hold my head high above my enemies who surround me...My heart has heard you say, "Come and talk with me." And my heart responds, "Lord, I am coming" (Psalm 27:4-6, 8 NLT). When David wrote those words, there was no temple or 'house of the Lord'. So, what did he mean? That God is as close to you as a prayer; that you can seek the Lord, delight in the Lord, meditate on the Lord, and talk with the Lord anywhere and anytime. The words 'you're my place of quiet retreat' mean you can withdraw from people, pressures, and problems and draw fresh strength from the Lord by communing with Him in your heart and mind. It can happen anywhere and anytime.



MU MATTERS

Mothers' Union Matters....here at St John's, around the corner and across the world!

Amazingly I feel that the month of December has been quiet for our Branch. Not so in the wider Church but here we have been able to stand still and take a breath.

Disappointingly the end of the Triennium for our MU Diocese Service at Bradford Cathedral on Sat 23 November was cancelled at the last minute due to bad and very uncertain weather. I was able to attend an antidomestic abuse service at Halifax Minster and I went with Mabel and Carol Sanderson. It was a lovely reflective service where we prayed for all those caught up in domestic violence and abusive behaviour. There was a heart wrenching sketch depicting the control partners may have, using 12 or so different silk scarfs which started off as gifts and then as the number increased how they suffocated and imprisoned the partner. Then the sketch continued as the person got help and support from others and gradually the scarfs were lifted, leaving a calm and less vulnerable person. I hesitate to always say the female or to use personal pronouns since there is evidence that females also control their male partners.

The famous MU Goodie Stall was at the back of Church on Sunday 1st December and it kicked off fun and celebrations for the month.

The MU Wave of Prayer on Wednesday 8 January is being held in our Lady Chapel at the beginning of next year. This coincides with the Benefice's mid-week Eucharist Service, so that will be amazing to include prayers for MU Branches across the world and to read out some preprepared prayers which will enlighten us all and those who are attending, to the life and culture in some of our link Parishes in Africa and the Solomon Islands. At the end of the Service the Wave of Prayer continues into another Parish, and after each 30 minutes passes through and across England, the UK, and across the world. Everyone, as ever, is welcome.

Then on Tuesday 21 January the MU Branch go out for their "Christmas Lunch in January"!!! We are going to the Royal and Ancient. And then the MU year, celebrations, fun, prayers and reflections start all over again.

A blessed 2024 to you all, and great hopes and prayers for a very successful and thankful 2025.



...have found refuge on the gold-paved streets of Old London town after their visit to Rastrick, and what a successful visit it was.



Every member of the cast gave of their very best and it was obvious, by just watching them, how much they were enjoying themselves performing to sell-out audiences each night. We had new members plus many of our "old stagers" and they all worked well together bringing laughter and tears out of

the audience just at the correct time. The chorus of 13, of which 8 were under secondary school age were talented, vociferous and, like the cast, loving every minute of the shows. Diane, our MD plus Christie and Eleanor, our Choreographers know just how to get the best out of the children and adults. Our new piano was used to its best by Diane and the selection of songs proved very moving. An audience member commented how marvellous the chorus were compared to another local panto who had a much larger, but far less enthusiastic chorus. The scenery was so colourful and artistic and the wardrobes were equally well designed and fitting for the show; how lucky we are that we have such talented people and don't have to pay massive costs to hire these assets. Stage management was flawless with the audiences totally unaware as to what was going on in order for them to see a flawless finished product. The large and small props were equally impressive with Fitzwarren's stores shining and the fishes in the underwater scene unbelievably colourful, bringing with them the "wow" factor. Our new lights, including a new spot, were "spot on" (did you see what I did there?) and the sound effects caused plenty of laughs during the show. Our prompters who had attended many rehearsals were almost redundant during show week, just as we like it. Make-up was very impressive with much thought having gone into it and everyone arrived on stage on cue thanks to the devotion of our Caller.

We must also thank our publicity staff, photographer, ticket organisers, bar, shop and tea attendants, front of house staff plus the organisers of the last night party and, of course, all our willing mums etc who turn up to ensure that everything runs like clockwork. Our raffle donors were amazing this year with almost 90 prizes donated...a huge thank you to you all. BUT, to make everything worthwhile you need audiences and ours turned out to be the very best we could have wished for (including some from St Matthew's who obviously wanted to learn how to put on a proper pantomime).

Earlier in the year I, along with my daughters, decided that, due to home circumstances, this would be my last year as Producer/Director and Secretary and this turned out to be the correct decision when I had a serious fall at rehearsal and broke two ribs plus other bits and pieces. As a result of this my Assistant Director had to step into the breach and was responsible for much of the work that I would have been doing. For this I offer my HUGE THANKS to my friend of many years, Neil Denham who did a fantastic job and kept the pressure off me.

Eventually the realisation came at the end of the last show that this was it for me and I would be leaving the family with whom I had been involved for well over forty years (over half of my life!). It wasn't easy and many tears were shed, by my family, by many audience members, by a myriad of people on stage, some of whom I'd known for the majority of those 40+ years, and, of course, by me,but it was the right decision.

I was presented with a very rare whisky, but, more importantly, a book with memories, thanks and good luck messages from so many people involved with this, and previous years shows; SOMETHING I WILL TREASURE FOR THE REST OF MY LIFE.

As Bob Hope always used to finish his shows "Thanks for the memories". I have been so lucky to do something I have enjoyed so much for over half of my life, so lucky to have been involved with so many wonderful people and so lucky that my genetic family have always supported me in my passion of pantomime.

This year was the 50^{th} show and I trust there will be at least another 50! With my love to you all,



On the Campaign Trail



How's our beleaguered planet fared during 2024?

The News is telling us quite clearly that fires, floods, cyclones are becoming more frequent, and the polar ice caps are melting. Many species are under threat. Plastic pollution is increasing...

I find it very reassuring that Jesus (e.g. in Matthew Ch 24) told us the end times would be difficult. My hope isn't in the poltical process or in technology, rather in the Resurrection of Jesus who said to his disciples, "Be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." (John 16 vs 33). BUT I care deeply about our world, as He does, knowing that the victims of climate change have done the least to cause it.

COP29 wasn't a complete flop. Hosted by Khazakstan, an oil state, commitments to phase out fossil fuels were always going to struggle. Rich countries weren't queuing out the door to commit finance to developing nations. But at least these subjects are becoming centre stage and will top future agendas.

The International Plastics Treaty Negotiations didn't end with an agreement. But the charities were pleased that a weak, watered-down treaty was rejected. Efforts continue to agree a treaty to eliminate plastic waste.

In both cases, the U.K made a contribution we can be proud of. On 24th January, MP's will vote on a Climate and Nature Bill (CAN) which, if it passes, will legally commit the government to a course of sustainability. More to come soon!

As we move into a New Year, I thought this little hymn which I learned in Sunday School when I was about four or five, might lift our spirits.


Jesus bids us shine with a clear, pure light, Like a little candle burning in the night; In this world of darkness, we must shine, You in your small corner, and I in mine.
